Indian Day a big success.



To take care of an elder you do not have to love them. But to care for an elder is to sit beside them in their last hours, to cry with them or for5 them, to comb their hair the way they want it combed, to walk their pace. It is to take the time to learn what they have been through in their life and to make sure that they have the resources they need to be all they can still be. It is to experiment until you find the key to their peace of mind if it can be found instead of just medicating, to make their special meal and ask the elder's opinion on how lunch should be cooked. It is to take ten minutes out of your day to drive to Grace Home and share an inspiration about the God they love and worship, to go sit in a chair and sing along during the church service to show them that their Christian life is important to you even if the elder listens from their room. It is to sit in front of an elder for an hour to massage their feet so they can relax and forget their search for a husband who has passed away several years ago or for family members who they think have come to visit them. It is to have their favorite clock that they got for their 25th wedding anniversary on the wall in their room to show them that they are home. It is to hold their hand as they face tormenting paralyzing fear from their past as it looms up in their muddled minds, to read chapter after chapter from the Bible to the elder who that is the only comfort left in the world. It is to sit and talk to and elder who has been in the Navy and allow him to share his stories. It is to take an interest in your horoscope or a certain team for the sole purpose of giving an elder the feeling of connection. It is to walk away from the mountain of work piled on your desk and take the time to find a private spot with an elder and find out what happened to their smile, to go to their bedside and learn the reason why they would not like to get up and then to fix the problem. It is to ensure their dignity is intact when you are finished with your time spent with them and to leave them feeling better about themselves from the love you shared with them. That is what Grace Home stands for and that is why we put our heart into these dear ones who God has told us to honor.



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
