the World:

Paris

We have been traveling around the world for several years now. In July of this year, we reached our destination of Paris, France. It took us seven months to travel from New York City. We celebrated this arrival with a party in which we served eclairs and macarons with coffee or hot tea. There was a power point on England along with some Google searches of Paris. Did you know:

The Louvre is the world's biggest art museum having over 38,000 pieces of art including the most famous painting ever, Mona Lisa. It would take nearly eight months to view every piece of art.

The Eiffel Tower is not the most visited monument in Paris. Most visited attraction is the cathedral Notre-Dame, then Sacre-Couer Basilica and the Louvre Museum.

There are more than 300,000 dogs living in Paris equaling one dog for every seven people. It is common to spend half a million dollars on these pets.

Around 5 million people use the Paris Metro per day.

The French army still use carrier pigeons. They are kept in case of a major catastrophe.

The city's first café has been in business 90 years longer than the US has been a country.

Every summer, the city hauls in tons of sand and palm trees and brings the beach to Paris.

Below the streets of Paris lies the Catacombs with the remains of over 6 million people. Only a few people know how to access the full 170 plus miles of underground tunnels and chambers beyond the Catacombs. These same tunnels also connect to bomb shelters that were used as protection during World War II.

IN LOVING MEMORY

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IDT

IDT stands for Interdisciplinary team. This team consists of the head of each department except Maintenance, Laundry/Housekeeping. The Administrator, DON, Assistant DON, DSD(Director of Staff Development & MDS coordinator), Medical Records, CDM(Dietary Manager), SS(Social Services), and QLD(Activity Director) meet every Wednesday after care plan meetings are finished for the day. We look at weekly weights of residents that are losing or gaining too much to see if it is fluid retention or possible other problems. We talk about staffing problems and have a small meeting on Psychotropic drugs. In this section of the meeting, we discuss whether there are residents that have been on these medications, but we feel like their quality of life would be improved if they were taken off or had a decrease in amount. We also look to see if our other residents are still doing okay or if there is someone whose behaviors cannot be controlled by nondrug interventions.

To continue on with our IDT meeting, we discuss any Falls that have happened over the last week and what we can do to prevent future falls for that resident. The same thing goes for skin tears and bruises. We also get a report on hospitalizations and hospice residents.

Any new Covid updates are shared and, if needed, discussion is given on how to implement new AFLs.

There is a section of the meeting designated to Infection Control where we get a report of any infections in the facility and what is being done for these residents. Any resident issues or safety issues that we know about are talked about as well as any dates to remember. Business that does not fall into the above categories is discussed at the end of the meeting. Follow up is given to the business from the week before.

The purpose of these meetings is to pull all our departments together to care for the residents instead of nursing doing their thing and activities doing their thing and possibly conflicting because we don't know enough about the resident to all be working together. For example, if someone is up all night and sleeps all day, activities and nursing need to work together to keep that resident awake all day so they will sleep at night along with light therapy to reset the circadian rhythm. Or if someone is showing behaviours, instead of just putting them on a medication right away, we can try to increase their participation in activities that they enjoy or try to understand why they are acting the way they are. Maybe it is something as simple as needing to be toileted or pain or needing to be able to make choices. Or maybe they are just bored. All departments working together can improve the residents' quality of life immensely. No one person can think of everything alone.
